All page margins 2,5 cm

Title
(Font Times New Roman 14, bold, centered)

Name Surname, Organization (font size 14, bold, centered)

***Annotation:** font size 12, line spacing 1, justified alignment, indent of the first row of the paragraph 1,25 cm, italic, word “Annotation“ bold and italic*

***Keywords:** font size 12, line spacing 1, justified alignment, indent of the first row of the paragraph 1,25 cm, italics, words “Key words“ bold and italic*

Length of the text should not exceed 20 norm pages (font size 12, line spacing 1,5 justified alignment, indent of the first row of the paragraph 1,25 cm). Subchapters should be without numbering, their titles in bold, text of subchapter without empty line after title, empty line should be put only before new subchapter’s title. We suggest using footnotes and include bibliography at the end of article in the alphabetical order.

Style of tables, figures and pictures should be decided by author.

- When two authors share the same surname, use their full names, e.g.: Wang Meiyang 2007; Wang Yaping 2004.
- Archival references may be left in footnotes.
